It is hard to believe that we've wrapped up Q1 for 2016 and are well into April! The first quarter of 2016 proved to be very busy at Girls Thinking Global and we are excited to share a few of our highlights with you!

**We began the year** with great news by learning that the NEA Foundation had accepted our grant proposal to begin working on data visualization for the <u>GTG Collaborative!</u> Their grant will enable us to begin the important work of sharing the benefits of the Collaborative as we continue to raise funds for its overall development.

**In February,** we kicked-off our edWeb webinar series designed to foster leadership in women and girls. Ann McMullan, a leader in the world of education technology implementation, presented *Life Lessons in Leadership*. In early April, Deb Delisle, executive director of ASCD and former U.S. Assistant Secretary of Elementary and Secondary Education presented *Courageous Leadership*. We've had 549 people attend the live webinars, and 1,463 people register and receive the presentations. We were also thrilled to add, Cynthia Schultz, to the Girls Thinking Global Board of Directors in February. Cynthia brings a wealth of knowledge and experience in the private sector as well as in the operations of both the government and non-profit sectors. She currently serves as the General Counsel and Chief Compliance Officer to Affiniti. In this capacity, she oversees the legal affairs of the company, including litigation and public policy initiatives. We are delighted to welcome her as our newest board member!

**In March,** we were busy attending meetings that were central to girls' issues around the world. Cynthia Schultz attended the Global Strategy to Empower Adolescent Girls hosted by Secretary of State John Kerry in Washington, D.C. Secretary Kerry shared that the State Department will be working with countries to help them change their laws in order to educate girls, stop forced early childhood marriage, and end the practice of female genital mutilation. All three of these policies going forward will be part of the diplomatic dialogue between nations and tied to US funding.



The California Association of African American School Administrators also screened our documentary at their conference in March. 



**Later in April,** we look forward to participating in the Girls' Education Leadership Network meeting at the Brookings Institute in Washington, D.C. Kathy Hurley and Deb deVries attended the 60th Commission on the Status of Women at the United Nations in New York. One of the many sessions they attended was Mothers Legacy Project, which addressed the need for more access to education, healthcare and modern training for women to reduce both maternal deaths and infant mortality rates related to pregnancy and childbirth.

Panel members included Robin Fink and Narcisa Masheinto who were both featured in our documentary, *The Heart of Everything: Jungle Mamas – Changemakers in the Amazon.*They discussed the work of Jungle Mamas and the importance of the having the documentary, not only in English and Spanish, but also in the native Achuar language as it has served as an awareness and education tool in explaining the benefits of the program to the indigenous Achuar population they are serving.


